HURRICANE SURGE

NBHS Boys Volleyball Team Advances to Second Straight State Tournament Appearance

In 2021, the New Britain High School Boys Volleyball Team took home just four wins in their second season as a program. Most of the players were brand new to volleyball and could have quit. They could have tried different sports. But they didn't. The team dedicated themselves to growing the young program and putting New Britain on the map for Boys Volleyball as a family. The team went on to qualify for the state tournament in both 2022 and 2023.

"In the beginning, we were losing a lot, and we wanted to get better. After that first season together, we really started to take the sport seriously because we wanted to become a top team and win," said Davin Siharath, an NBHS senior and captain who recently became the first player from the program to commit to playing volleyball in college. "We trained outside of school, joined club, and played all year long. We weren't where we wanted to be, and that gave us the drive that brought us to where we are today."

Coach Michelle Abraham said that drive is what she is most proud of when it comes to the Boys Volleyball team. While the team is relatively new, Abraham is no stranger to the sport of volleyball. A 1985 NBHS graduate herself,

Abraham was a three-sport athlete playing volleyball, basketball, and softball. She has been coaching the girls team since 1988 and founded the boys program in 2019.

"When you establish a program, you want to win, but it takes time," said Abraham. "Our success really is coming from these boys. They are working all the time. They're in the gym, they're finding ways to play outside together. They go to parks, they drive to Bristol to play at an outdoor facility. They put in the work, and it shows."

As a coach of boys and girls volleyball, Abraham has over 380 wins, 19 state tournament appearances, 5 league championships, and 1 state championship. She is a member of the New Britain Sports Hall of Fame, the 2022 CT High School Coaches Association Coach of the Year, and the 2018 National High School Coaches Association Finalist. This year, the Boys Volleyball team added more accolades to the list earning the 2023 CCC East Co-Conference Championship title and advancing to the CIAC Class L Tournament for the second year in a row, just five years after the team's inception.

"Her stats are impressive, but anyone who knows Coach

Abraham will tell you she doesn't coach for the accolades. She does it for the kids," said Lisa Kawecki, Assistant Coordinator of Physical Education, Health, and Wellness for CSDNB. "She's an incredible coach, a mentor for others, and we are lucky to have her in New Britain. She sets the bar high."

Abraham says she started coaching to give back to the city she grew up in, to provide the same experience she had as a student-athlete and all the benefits that came with sports. She says her coaching philosophy comes down to the importance of building a rapport with students and trust.

"I'm most proud of this team's continuity and drive. They saw what was out there and what they needed to do to be successful and set their own goal," said Abraham. "I don't put limits on them. They know what they're capable of doing and they strive for it. When we lose they're visibly upset, and that indicates to me how much they want to win and how much they're invested in the program and getting New Britain sports back to where they used to be."

The culture Abraham strives to create in her teams is evident when you take a look at her players. Lexus Sanchez, a senior captain, was new to volleyball his sophomore year and says the

sport has changed him off the court as well.

"Volleyball has helped me a lot mentally. I used to get down on myself a lot, I felt I wasn't good at much, and then volleyball came and showed me I have to be passionate about whatever I'm going to do. I have to push myself to my limits and put my heart into it," said Sanchez. "The way this team has grown means a lot to me."

In just three years, Sanchez has built up his own impressive resume. He made All-Conference his junior and senior seasons and was named Second Team All-State last year.

The Hurricanes advanced to the 2023 CIAC State Tournament as the 7 seed with an impressive 15-5 overall record. As the 7 seed, they secured a home match, showing huge growth as a program in just a few short years. Abraham said she hopes the program's success will garner more exposure for all New Britain athletes, giving more student-athletes the opportunity to play at the next level as colleges and universities take notice.

"Most of us remember when we weren't the best team. We put in so much work, so many hours in and out of the gym and I'm so proud of how far we've come," said Siharath. "Now we get the chance to see all of the hard work pay off, and it's amazing."

I would like to thank Mr. Tabs [Thomas Tabellione] for the hallway walk junior year.


What is your biggest piece of advice for incoming freshmen?



Improvements in iReady Scores

Spring iReady Testing has been completed for all current students in grades K-8. Scores are being compiled to be presented to the board at a later date. Compared to last spring (Spring 21-22 compared to Spring 22-23) most schools made an average of 5.1% improvement in Literacy in students scoring in tier 1 and a 4.7% average increase in students performing at tier 1 in Math.

We thank HMF for their continued partnership and look forward to inviting more schools to run this fall, thanks to DICK's Sporting Goods!






Lincoln Elementary School Celebrates Children's Mental Health



New Britain High School offers so many unique opportunities. One of our favorites is the chance to graduate with the CT Seal of Biliteracy.




Surprise Donation Pushes Ben Cheney Memorial Fundraising over \$100,000





Pulaski Science Fair Returns


Space in the Community



What's New and Happening at CSDNB?

Grade 5 to Grade 6 Transition: Student Devices. Accounts and AUP

Grade 5 Students will return their student devices at the end of the year, regardless of their condition. Those devices will be assessed and used accordingly based on condition as loaners, carts devices, or parts for repairs. Students will receive a replacement device at the start of Grade 6 in their middle school. The new device will remain with the student through grade 12. Participating in the student device insurance program will help ensure the device stays in good working order for years to come.

Please be aware that student account passwords change in Grade 6. Students will receive the new account information from their middle school. It is important parents use their own PowerSchool accounts instead of their child's to avoid losing access.

Students are required to have passed the Acceptable Use Policy quiz by the start of grade 6 in order to gain web access on the school system's network. While hundreds of fifth grade students have already completed it in the past month, it is important that all grade 5 students complete this process. The quiz is accessed through the powerschool portal for students. Students will get an alert when they log into PowerSchool if they still need to take this quiz.






