The donation includes saxophones, violins, clarinets, flutes, and trumpets.



# THE SMALLEY HOTSTIX!

#### SMALLEY ELEMENTARY DRUMLINE BUILDS STUDENT CONFIDENCE

A quick Google search for 'elementary school drumline' would show you how rare the after-school program is for elementary-age students in the Northeast. However, Smalley Elementary School recently became the second school in New Britain to offer the experience to students in grades third through fifth.

Lisa Troiani, a paraeducator at Smalley, runs the afterschool program two days a week at Smalley. Troiani created the Jefferson Elementary School HotStix drumline over 20 years ago, having no previous drumming experience. After transferring schools as a paraeducator, she knew she wanted to start another drumline.

"I really started it to give kids a place to blow off steam and to get involved in music because I think it helps with learning," said Troiani. "It helps with a lot of different things, like confidence, and can keep them engaged all the way through high school. It has a positive effect, even if they don't stay in drumming."

After-school programs, like HotStix, provide many benefits for students. Research shows participation can lead to better

grades and test scores, improved school attendance, decreased participation in at-risk behaviors, an exploration of diverse interests, and improved social and life skills.

"I have to be good in school and in practice to be the captain," said Angel, a fifth-grader who started drumming this past fall and is now the HotStix Captain.

Angel was one of nearly 100 students who tried out for the program at Smalley. Troiani said she looked for kids with rhythm and coordination and got to work teaching it all from there.

"It makes me feel special," said Adrianna, a 4th-grader and fellow HotStix drummer. "It makes me feel good to show the kindergarteners that one day they could do this too."

All HotStix participants signed a student contract agreeing to manage their time and complete all their school and homework in addition to striving to be consistent peer role models, meaning they're leaders in the school and respectful at all times, not just at drumline.

"I think you have to behave because other kids look up to

you, and you have to be responsible," said Mahlak, a 5th-grader who just joined the drumline in January but put in the work to be ready for the first performance this spring, despite having never drummed before.

Like Mahlak, most of the drummers have zero previous experience and can't read music yet. They play completely from memory and focus to not only remember the beats but stay in sync with one another, something Troiani says is no easy task.

"This was their first performance ever, and I wanted it here," said Troiani. "It's just a whole new thing when you have hundreds of eyes on you. It's just such a special thing."

Troiani said the students were incredible in their debut and the HotStix have since received several invitations to perform outside of Smalley, including at the upcoming Celebrate New Britain community-wide event.

"Students in the program have become much more confident, not just in drumming but as learners. Students can see the return on investing time in practicing something to become

really good at it," said Smalley Principal Andrea Foligno. "Some of these students struggled with self-esteem prior to becoming a member of the HotStix."

For many, that confidence and pride is bubbling up post performance.

"Hearing everyone scream so excited to see us made me feel proud of myself," said Angel. "I have people looking up at me. I have a younger sibling, I'm a twin and a big brother, and I'm really proud."

# NEW FOODS IN NEW BRITAIN

When someone says school lunch, what types of food typically come to mind? In New Britain, our food service provider is dedicated to making sure the connotation is not only positive but delicious and healthy. CSDNB is proud to be partnered with Whitsons Culinary Group as they continue to advance school nutrition and increase access for students to organic food through new cutting-edge menu items and changes.

"Student nutrition is at the heart of ensuring that students are ready to learn," said Dr. Tony Gasper, Superintendent of Schools. "In the Essential 10 we say, 'Students attend regularly and are ready to learn.' I hope that this nutritious and appetizing food is one more reason for kids to come to school every day."

The enhanced menu features fresh, local, and eco-friendly options. In April, Whitsons launched three of their five new organic menu options in New Britain and will debut two more this month. We caught up with Vance Elementary School students during their lunch wave when honey-glazed wild-caught local Atlantic salmon was served as a meal option for the first time.

"This is really good. It is very juicy," said Felix, a Vance Elementary School 3rd-grader. "I've had salmon before, but I think it's good they're doing new foods so other people can try it too."

Behind the scenes, Whitsons is taking extra steps to introduce the new menu items to students. Their team has been traveling from school to school to offer samples in the days leading up to each new item's lunchtime debut to slowly introduce students to potentially unfamiliar foods and to build excitement for the changes before each becomes a full meal option.

"We're really taking a much healthier approach," said Jeffrey Taddeo, Whitsons Resident District Manager. "Unfortunately, some of our kids don't have access to this type of food, so it's really imperative that we introduce a variety and give kids opportunities that they might not be afforded in their home environment."

When it came time to debut the salmon for lunch, Whitsons paired it with a brown rice pilaf and a fresh ginger marinated edamame salad. Taddeo said the salmon has been the most popular new menu item to date.

"This was my first time having salmon, and I liked it," said Serenity, a Vance 3rd-grader. "I didn't try it during the taste testing but decided to try it today, and I like it a lot."

Other new lunch menu items in the month of April included an avocado ranch grass-fed burger served on a whole grain pretzel bun with smashed avocado, salsa fresca, and ranch drizzled waffle fries in addition to a house-made eggplant parmesan with organic salad and an asiago dusted



breadstick. Whitsons is also diversifying its breakfast options, with overnight oats and acai bowls rapidly gaining in popularity across the district.

Superintendent Gasper said he challenged Taddeo with two questions; Why not us, why can't we be known as the district giving kids the best food in the state?

"Jeff and his team have taken to this challenge with a lot of enthusiasm," said Gasper. "I asked two simple questions, and Jeff did the rest. I'm looking forward to even more menu improvements in the coming school year."

In addition to the new items, Whitsons is transitioning to organic options for many of its everyday items. All yogurt in the parfaits now comes from Stoneyfield Organic, a leader in organic yogurt that sources its dairy from organic farms throughout the Northeast. Whitsons is also transitioning to source tree fruit through a program featuring a network of local growers who are committed to rigorous ecological standards regionally tailored to local climate conditions.

"I think these kinds of menu changes are extremely rare. It's not typical for schools to serve Atlantic salmon, parmesan-crusted cod, and daily organic items, but our district has really adopted the philosophy of why not us from Dr. Gasper," said Taddeo. "We have a tremendous amount of support from the operations and leadership team helping us drive our mission forward."

New menu items for May include a parmesan-crusted local fresh baked cod served with asparagus and whole wheat cous cous tabouleh and a free-range organic arroz con pollo served with a tomato cucumber salad and a fresh whole grain corn loaf.

"My long-term goal is to fully recreate our culinary program to be diverse with cultural and sustainable items. I want every one of our kids to have the opportunity to have the most relevant culinary trends and the healthiest program not just in the state but in the nation," said Taddeo.

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"I want others in the food service industry to see you can feed your children healthy food no matter where you are. It doesn't matter if you're in the inner cities or not. It should be equitable for our kids, for every kid in the country, regardless of race or income. Our kids deserve access to the best food available and we are going to keep pushing to give it to them."


#### **Holmes International Dinner Returns**


#### Culinary Team Gets 'Sneaky-Clean'





#### Pulaski Science Fair

# CSDNB'S STUDENT DEVICE INSURANCE PROGRAM

We all know accidents happen.


