# A FRESH FOCUS ON LITERACY

#### **ARC CURRICULUM UPDATE**

Students across the district reading fiction and non-fiction topics every day, and writing about what they read, thanks to a partnership with the American Reading Company (ARC). The comprehensive reading program was rolled out in August 2023 to over 400 staff members representing a paradigm shift in the district's approach to literacy instruction.

"ARC has been a great tool to get both fiction and nonfiction books at students' independent levels in their hands for daily practice. It is nice to have a library that is organized so that students can easily choose 'just right' books," said Christina Deprey, Smith Elementary School First Grade Teacher. "My students are noticing a lot more word patterns and 'power words' now that we are using ARC. They are also able to sustain independent reading for longer than in years past now that they have access to many books on their level."

Last year, The State of Connecticut enacted language regarding reading instruction in the Fiscal Year 24 appropriations bill requiring all public school districts to either choose a new comprehensive reading program from a menu of six options or ask for a waiver to delay the decision. CSDNB's leadership made the decision to vet materials and launch a program in the fall of 2023 for all K-5 students, rather than delay, to move further towards the goal of ensuring all students are reading and writing on, or above, grade level.

Students, staff, families, and community members were invited to review the menu of options and helped CSDNB identify ARC as the best fit. Prior to ARC, not all teachers districtwide were taking a comprehensive approach to teaching reading in seven key areas: oral language, comprehension, vocabulary, phonics, phonemic awareness, and rapid letter naming.

are listening to the teacher read and having discussions. Sometimes the students are working in small groups to shore up some of their reading skills. Sometimes everyone is writing," said Deputy Superintendent Ivelise Velazquez. "Overall, we see much more reading taking place and a whole lot more excitement about reading!"

Deprey said her students really look forward to their small-group reading time each day during reading toolkit lessons. "I have enjoyed the small group reading toolkit lessons the most as well, since the lessons teach foundational literacy skills in a systematic and explicit way that solidifies con cepts for students," said Deprey.

The implementation of any new program, such as ARC, may present challenges. The Academics Leadership Team was able to design the school calendar in a way that gave staff more time for professional learning to improve practice. In November, CSDNB hosted the first of two full day professional development sessions planned throughout the year which provided time for teachers to plan, ask questions, and discuss how to reset if that what they needed with districtwide grade level teams.

"I think a full day of professional development is impactful because we get a lot of time time to collaborate with our teams. It's nice because we can also get some ideas from other schools for things we can implement into our first grade classrooms since we obviously do things differently as teams," said Meaghan McLaughlin, Vance Elementary School First Grade Teacher after leaving an ARC training with first grade teachers from across the district. "We'll go back and apply that knowledge, connect that to our teaching, and do whats best for our students."

One of the key objectives of ARC is to develop readers who can sustain reading for longer periods of time, deeply understand the content, and effectively articulate their thoughts about what they've learned through both discussion and writing.

"No two students become expert readers along the same path. As educators, we must understand that every child is different and we must differentiate what we do to engage them in the reading process that is best for them rather than depending on a one size fits all approach. The science of reading is broad and not narrowly based on phonics alone," said Velazauez. "We are seeing lots of new reading behaviors that were not apparent before and we hear students talking about their favorite books or talking about what they want to grab next."

Lillie Stuart, District Coordinator of Language Arts said the district's focus on literacy is critical, thanking the district teachers, administrators, and coaches who have been the backbone of the ARC rollout.

"Literacy is the gateway to all other content areas. If kids can't read they really don't have access to their education so thats really why we are taking this so seriously in New Britain."



During this two-day introductory experience, participants learned the fundamental theory and practices for engaging with students, staff, and parents in their school setting.

Building and strengthening relationships and community is a critical component of school culture. Restorative practices is an essential process for creating a positive learning environment, building social capital, and resolving relational issues. Additional training sessions will be offered in December allowing more staff to attend. Additionally, trained staff will be sharing strategies with colleagues and offering mini professional development sessions to continue moving this work forward.




## CSDNB CELEBRATES 'READ FOR THE RECORD' WITH THE UNITED WAY




#### EDUCATORS RISING STUDENTS GET HANDS ON EXPERIENCE AT SMALLEY




## OVER 400 NBHS STUDENTS CELEBRATED FOR PERFECT ATTENDANCE






## HARTFORD WOLF PACK SUPPORTS THE JEFFERSON JETS!






#### WAY TO GO NORTHEND!








## DECEMBER TECH TIP: POWERSCHOOL PARENT PORTAL APP VS WEB. WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?


