## SLADE MIDDLE SCHOOL CELEBRATES RED-RIBBON WEEK WITH DRUG-USE PREVENTION CAMPAIGN

At Slade Middle School, a commitment to a safe, healthy, and drug-free community was on display building wide during Red Ribbon Week. This initiative is the nation's largest and longest-running drug-use prevention campaign. At Slade, the campaign brought community members together to advocate for the well-being of children, families, and communities, all thanks to the recommendation of one 8th grade student and a school assistant principal's dedication to making her idea happen locally.
"I'm in a Youth Prevention Group. We were talking a while ago about prevention and what we can do in schools and I came up with the idea of doing a campaign to prevent vaping like we did last year around anti-bullying for vaping. I told Ms. Miele and Mr. Mazzei and they thought about it and did it" said Jermarie Gonzalez Santiago.

Gonzalez Santiago is an 8th grader at Slade and a member of the New Britain Local Prevention Council Youth Leadership Team. While most youth members are high schoolers, Gonzalez Santiago has already been active in her role, training to mentor younger students and volunteering at community activities such as the recent Lights on Afterschool that shined a light on the importance of afterschool programs for youth.
"Prevention is important to me because not all kids have a goal set in their life. They might think just because they don't have one they can use any type of substances but it's not like that. Even if you don't have a goal you need your body. You need your mental health stable so you can do anything."

After hearing Gonzalez Santiago's idea, Lauren Miele, Interim Assistant Principal said she saw this as an opportunity to plan a campaign for the school.
"I researched some school themed initiatives and saw that Red Ribbon Week was a national initiative happening in late October- I then figured out how to fit everything into the week to build context and excitement for our speaker assemblies to round out the week," said Miele.

Red Ribbon Week takes place annually from October 23 through October 31st. The week serves as a catalyst to mobilize communities, educate youth, and encourage participation in drug prevention activities. The Slade Stallions engaged in a range of activities aimed at education and prevention around the theme 'Be Kind to Your Mind. Live Drug Free.' This powerful message served as a call
to action for everyone to champion healthy choices and wellbeing. From informative sessions to pledge signings, surprise guest speakers, advisory lesson components, and a special wear-red dress down event, each day was a step towards fostering a drug-free environment.
"I loved the brave and vulnerable student participation in the assemblies but my favorite moment was seeing the campaign stickers that our partners at NB Parks and Recreation graciously donated all over students' clothes, chromebooks, and faces. It was an indicator that they took their pledges to remain vape, drug and alcohol free seriously and were proud to show off their token of participation," said Miele.

The week culminated with guest speakers from Pivot to Potential. Jill and Allan Griffin spoke to students, sharing their personal experiences with drugs and alcohol and the journey that brought them to sobriety today. Jill, a licensed clinical social worker and alcohol and drug counselor, also took the time to educate students on the dangers of using, especially at a young age. For Aaliyah Sanchez, a 6th grader, it was the highlight of the week.
"The presentation was my favorite part of the week. Sometimes 6th grade can be pretty wild but during the presentation everyone was just silent and listening. I feel like it really helped a lot of people," said Sanchez.

Several 'Natural High' activities were coordinated throughout the week, including staff vs. student kickball games. Mia Serrano, 7th grader, said that while the staff won every match, the experience was a lot of fun for the entire school community.
"Improving climate and opportunities to bring the student body together in alternative ways that are novel and feel humanizing have been one of my biggest priorities since coming on at Slade last year," said Miele. "Bringing learning that will serve students in their home and school life, social interactions and in their lives beyond middle school is perhaps one of the most critical components of our charge as educators. We are preparing them to make positive choices and trying to further impact them by showing we care about their well-being. Events like the kickball games allow us to build those meaningful, lasting relationships and trust with students that are requisite to reaching them."

## NBHS TEECHER RECOCNIIED BY MODERN CLASSROOMS PROJECT

Daniel Sorge, New Britain High School teacher, stands out as a beacon of excellence in the field of education. His dedication to his craft, and students, has garnered attention not just locally but nationally as students, staff, partners, and leaders in the field of education take notice.

Last spring, the Computer Science Teachers Association and Infosys Foundation USA identified Sorge as one of just 10 winners nationwide for their Teaching Excellence Awards. More recently, Sorge was recognized by the Modern Classroom Project as a Distinguished Modern Classroom Educator.
"Dan is a born teacher. He's the type of person who is always looking to help in any way he can and is refining the way we do things at NBHS. He is quietly effective," said Meg Shea, New Britain High School Associate Principal. "I think anybody who speaks with Dan is $2 \%$ better, just by having a conversation. He understands technology and he understands kids."

The Modern Classroom Project features a research-backed instructional model, built by teachers, that allows educators to meet the unique needs of every learner while empowering students to take charge of their own learning. Teachers create short content videos that students can move through
at their own pace preventing learning gaps.
"One of the biggest impacts is the ability for me to offer more personalized support and encouragement to my students," said Sorge. "This model allows me to spend more time working with individual or small groups of students. My students also enjoy the ability to self-direct their learning and master more content."

Sorge's instructional practice caters to all learners as students who may have previously been bored in class can speed up content and demonstrate mastery while others can rewatch content as needed and absent students can easily catch up on material.
"I like the self pacing in Mr. Sorge's class," said Priscilla Rivera, NBHS 11th-grader. "It's really nice actually. I can get ahead if I need to and don't have to wait for others to finish. It's unique. I haven't seen another teacher use this teaching style and I think it absolutely has had a positive impact on students."

Martin Nieves, 10th grader, said Sorge's teaching methods have helped him to be successful.
"The self paced lessons are very helpful as a student. You can
crush multiple lessons at a time if you're way behind. You don't have to stay on pace, you can do work on your own," said Nieves. "It's a really effective learning style."

Sorge voluntarily trained on the model over the summer after NBHS school administrators presented teh staff with the opportunity. He enrolled in the Modern Classroom Summer Institute training program to learn how to effectively implement the model at NBHS. Sorge is now part of a global community of educators eager to support one another in using the model.
"Rolling out this instructional model across multiple classes for the first time was challenging. One of the core elements of this model is the utilization of mastery checks, which are designed as opportunities for students to demonstrate their understanding of the most important takeaways from each lesson. I needed to come up with an efficient way to structure this," said Sorge. "After working with the model for a bit, I have been able to streamline the process by reorganizing my physical classroom space, designating areas in the room for mastery checks and utilizing a variety of progress-trackers to identify levels of mastery amongst my students."

Sorge began teaching at NBHS three years ago and has helped strengthen the computer science pathway and taken on the role of Lead Teacher in the prestigious Academy of Business and Finance. Teaching courses such as mobile app development, principles of IT, and explorations of computer science, Sorge has created a pipeline of students poised to pursue advanced placement course offerings through a teaching philosophy founded on the belief that all students can achieve greatness.
"I can see myself having a career in Computer Science because of this class," said NBHS 10th-grader Julio Gervacio.

This month, Sorge will add training as a Modern Classroom mentor to his resume and says he hopes to support other teachers who are looking to integrate this instructional model into their work.
"Dan is doing such a phenomenal job," said Sondra Sanford, Coordinator of Partnerships and Engagement and National Academy Foundation Site Director. "His commitment to raising the bar for everything he touches is evident as he is always looking for ways to improve outcomes for our students. We are really proud to have him at NBHS."
